## **NB** Donation Initiative

The New Brunswick organ donation program has had several challenges since last year.

In the past 2 years there have been temporary consultants at the Department of Health responsible for the organ donation program.



## **Health Canada Inspection**

 May 31<sup>th</sup> notice was received that the Health Canada Inspection of the NB program was scheduled for July 3-6<sup>th</sup>

 The latest consultant, a permanent position, was hired June 18<sup>th</sup> 2012.

 The very steep learning curve needed to be accelerated<sup>©</sup>



Due to the current structure of the program, the Organ Donation Resource Nurses (ODRN) are located within 3 different facilities, the Department of Health consultant in an entirely different city.



Though technology provides many advantages, coordination and updating of documentation with sufficient input from the ODRN can be a challenge, face to face meetings work best for this.

Time was not on our side.



 As you all know, the Health Canada Inspection process is evolving as standards and regulations have been implemented and this latest inspection was very focused on program documentation.

 Charts created between 2009 and 2012 were audited.



- Of the 4 charts audited, 2 had been identified and reported by the NB program as having issues:
  - One was a testing process deviation which was appropriately reported, followed up and documented.
  - One was a non reportable test follow up, which was identified by the tissue program but did not affect the suitability of the organ.

One was complete and acceptable.



 One chart was flagged as the organs having been improperly released. This was based on the interpretation by the inspection team.

 On further Health Canada review it was determined that in fact there was no flaw in the donor suitability process for that patient.



 The way the inspection unfolded, the NB program suspended service, choosing to err on the side of safety, but was never officially deemed non compliant.

 This inspection provided an opportunity to both raise the profile and improve the program.



 Overall the timing of the inspection was fortuitous, in that it provided the opportunity for the new consultant to become immersed in the program very quickly.

 Our goal of a strong, more sustainable, organ donation program was given a little extra push in the aftermath of the inspection report.



 After a very long summer during which the program was short one ODRN; we are fortunate to have hired a new ODRN who began his orientation this week.
